Parish Council Precept

Before 1995, the year the Parish Council was formed, a petition was submitted by local residents calling for a Parish Council to be formed to represent the community at a local level when the boundary commission redesignated which County & Borough Colnbrook and Poyle would sit in. Hence the Parish Council was formed.

The precept is money that Slough Borough Council collect on behalf of the Parish Council.

For the last few years the Parish Council have been able to hold the precept cost at the same level. However 2015 threw up an exceptional cost arising from the need to have a second election following two elected candidates failing to comply with the legal requirement of signing their acceptance of office before or at the first meeting of the newly elected council.

Slough's returning officer had no alternative but to declare the two councillor positions vacant. They then received a letter from a resident which included the names of a number of registered electors calling for a by-election. The by-election duly took place.

Stand alone Elections or Polls for a Parish the size of Colnbrook with Poyle are not cheap, especially when some of the overheads cannot be shared with a District or Police & Crime Commissioner election.

The cost of this second election was £6,607.90.

We have endeavoured to recover the costs from the individuals concerned and also from the Political Party they ran for and were supported by. The individuals have not shown the courtesy of replying to our letters and the Political Party concerned consider that they have no responsibility whatsoever in the matter. Perhaps this is a pointer that Political Parties are best not involved in Parish Council elections.

As a result of the above and in order to continue doing the things we do the council have found it necessary to make a small increase to this year's precept. The average increase is expected to be less than $\pounds 2$ per household per year depending on the banding level of the home.

You can rest assured that the Council will continue to strive to deliver good value for all its residents.

Heathrow/Airports Commission



As most people will be aware the Government have announced that having made an initial study of the Airports Commission's report they accept that an additional runway will be required in the South East of England by the year 2030.

Whilst the Airports Commission indicate Heathrow's third runway as the best option the government consider that further study is required especially in terms of the needs to meet air quality requirements. They now anticipate making a decision in the summer. In the meantime all three proposals, Heathrow, Heathrow Hub and Gatwick are deemed to be credible options and remain on the table.

Below we give recent answers received in respect of outstanding questions raised at the Heathrow drop in Q & A session held in Colnbrook on 30th September last year. The earlier answers can be found on the Parish Council website **colnbrookwithpoyle-pc.gov.uk**

Colnbrook session outstanding Q &A

Response from Heathrow: We have responded to the specific queries raised at the Colnbrook Residents drop-in session on Heathrow expansion. These answers are offered as our best view at this point in time - we are still in the process of working up detailed explanation documents on property compensation and Heathrow Expansion to help local people understand this complex area. These documents would be available 2-3 months after a positive Government decision.

 Will HAL consider a compensation payment system for those in the wider property offer zone who wish to stay in their homes but wish to have the loss of amenity in the use of their garden considered?

Heathrow currently has no plan to implement a discretionary scheme, over and above the existing statutory framework, for these circumstances. A loss of amenity could be the subject of what is known as

a Part I claim that could be lodged after the runway has been operational for a year. We may consider, during the course of any planning application process, whether the suggested idea is an effective way of managing these types of potential future claims.

2. Regarding properties that are shared ownership, what is the legal effect of the housing association having first refusal on purchasing the property?

We have not yet investigated in detail the legal issues behind this. However, our current offer will not alter the terms on which shared ownership is secured – i.e. the Housing Association having a first charge. The eligible 'owner' will need to seek the necessary consents from the housing association first to determine whether they are in a position to sell their interest to Heathrow under our Wider Property Zone offer, just as they would if they were planning to sell on the open market. Subject to the "owner" being able to sell their share to us, our offer will apply to the portion of the equity that they hold.

3. If I need to go into a residential care home before you start buying properties, would Heathrow buy my property?

Anyone who meets the terms of a future Hardship scheme (which we will consult on following a positive Government decision) will be eligible to have Heathrow purchase their property. This would be at its unblighted market value. Our current intention is that an interim form of Hardship scheme would be open for applications soon after the date of any positive Government decision.

4. If house prices fall as a result of the proposals to build a runway and don't recover, will Heathrow compensate home owners?

Principally our Wider Property Zone offer (for those who are eligible) but also our statutory obligations under the compensation code (e.g. Part I claims) will ensure that every homeowner with a compensatable interest will receive appropriate compensation

5. If Heathrow receives planning permission but decides not to build the runway, will you compensate residents for the stress of the past few years of uncertainty.

Throughout the promotion of the project to the point of receiving planning permission, Heathrow will have

a Hardship Policy in place to provide assistance to homeowners who demonstrate that they need to sell and have been unable to do so because of the proposals.

6. What will happen to house prices in the surrounding areas which are likely to be driven up by demand from displaced home owners?

House prices in the surrounding areas will be subject to many different influencing factors (the advent of Crossrail, the continuing movement of population into the South East etc). The timescale over which our Wider Property Zone offer is currently anticipated to be open (from receipt of planning consent to a year after the runway begins to operate, a period of about 6 years) is purposefully designed to provide plenty of time for homeowners to search for suitable property and relocate. This will limit any potential for a surge in property prices driven by those wishing to move to avoid Heathrow expansion. Over the life of the project, homeowners (outside the CPO zone) will not be under any pressure to move quickly or until they have found somewhere suitable to move to.

7. If someone who is eligible to qualify for the compensation package were to die and their property was inherited by a relative or someone else would the compensation eligibility carry over even though they may not have directly owned the property for the prescribed length of time?

If the property was bequeathed by an owner occupier then the heirs will still be eligible for our Property Offers. Our future Hardship scheme will also be drafted in a way that allows the potential for personal representatives of deceased owners to apply for Heathrow to purchase the property if, following the owner's passing, the property must be sold and a sale on the open market has not proved possible except at a price below what might otherwise have been reasonably expected.

Representatives of the Parish Council recently attended a Health & Wellbeing workshop arranged by Slough Clinical Commissioning Group and whilst the whole event was very informative there was a

particular area which concerned us and requires the population of our Parish to take note of. This relates to the uptake of medical screening and available immunisation.

Generally the uptake in Slough is lower than national averages and this may be for any number of reasons. However we are keen to spread the message:

"PLEASE SERIOUSLY CONSIDER & TAKE
UP ANY OFFERS OF SCREENING OR
IMMUNISATION THAT YOUR GP's SURGERY
OFFER TO YOU OR YOU FIND AVAILABLE".

Most screening or immunisation is offered on an "age" or "at risk" related basis. It's offered for good reason. Early diagnosis of conditions generally leads to better outcomes. Immunisation not only protects the individual but can also help protect the many others they come into contact with.

Your local practice is the best place to find out what is available and appropriate to you and your family but listed below are some of the more common screening and immunisation programmes.

- Breast cancer screening
- Bowel cancer screening
- Cervical cancer screening
- Blood pressure (also available at most pharmacists)
- Flu immunisation (annually)
- Shingles immunisation
- Pneumococcal Vaccination
- MMR (Measles Mumps and Rubella) Vaccination

Colnbrook Flood Action Group

Hi everyone

The Colnbrook Flood Action Group (C-FAG) have been working throughout the last year and meeting with the relevant agencies to ensure that our village is not at risk in the event of any kind of severe weather fronts.

In October last year we met with Thames Water, The Environment Agency, The National Flood Forum and Slough Borough Council to discuss matters such as boreholes, soakaways, gauge boards, the county ditch and concerns around the dredging of areas such as the Albany Park ditch.

Members of the team carry out regular walk abouts in and around the village and relay information to the Environment Agency who also visit our village and carry out observations of bore holes soakaways and ditch areas.

With recent flooding in the north of England our team is on a 'standby' status until we are confident that there is no longer any threat of flooding.

In the event of a village emergency the Village Hall will become our 'Hub' from here we will brief and update. The team now have in place an Emergency Procedure Plan which has been shared with Slough Borough Council and we are also linked in with them for updates

For now we are not at risk, and the team will continue their work.

Now the focus is also moving to raising funds / donations for our cause so that we can purchase equipment to help in the event of an emergency event in the village.

The Colne Valley Park CIC

During recent years the Colne Valley Park and its directors have been facing some of the most extreme challenges to the park. The future period through 2016 shows no sign of the pressures lifting. Much of the impacts occurring at the present time are not within the realm of standard planning regulation, which are decided locally, instead decisions are made by Central Government and the Secretary of State.

This area of the park that Colnbrook with Poyle resides in has the greatest number of Nationally Significant Infrastructure Projects (NSIPs) either being progressed or are waiting for the process to commence:-

- M4 Smart Motorway
- Heathrow additional capacity (if approved as the site for expansion)
- Western Rail Access to Heathrow (WRAtH)
- Slough International Freight Exchange (SIFE) Awaiting decision by the Secretary of State, scheduled for April.

Additional impacts will be associated with them as consent is granted, i.e. construction compounds, construction workers' caravan sites, spoils deposits not forgetting the construction vehicles adding to the current congested road network. These developments will also impact upon our neighbouring communities, Richings Park, Iver, Langley and Iver Heath – all affected by the construction haul routing and certainly the closer communities with dust and noise. Similarly the construction of the Langley Heathrow Express depot, not taking place within this parish boundary, but a large number of construction vehicles scheduled to use Sutton Lane and London Road (A4) to reach the M4 motorway, creating greater detriment to air quality on an area already seriously compromised.

There may be a case for local communities to co-operate with each other on a unified approach to seek mitigation for the negative impacts. A consolidated approach between several cross boundary communities has a more reasoned chance of success than several individual claims, which are likely to have differing arguments allowing the developer to exploit the differences thus reducing his liability.





The Colne Valley Park CIC is committed to ensuring that if any of these current developments go ahead, they provide substantial



The Colne Valley Park CIC had its second foray at the HS2 select committee on Monday 25th January 2016 when both Sir John Randall, our newest director, and I presented our case for mitigation resulting from the Additional Provisions to the Bill, relocating the Heathrow Express Deport from Old Oak Common to the Langley. Supporting our communities of the Colne Valley Park who will be impacted and most importantly ensuring that aftercare plans for the mitigated land improvements has a robust plan for the continued improvements for biodiversity.

The photograph below, taken in the north sector of the park, shows a group of us walking the footpaths around the Old Shire Lane area. This area is one of many adversely impacted by HS2 in the Colne Valley Park. It is just one of the many reasons that we campaign so forcibly for the protections needed to sustain such fragile landscapes that is shared by wildlife and human habitation alike.

FLY-TIPPING/RUBBISH/LITTER

The reformed Neighbourhood Action Group, with representatives from all of the major organisations within Colnbrook, has been working hard to tackle the scourge of Fly-Tipping, Rubbish and Litter throughout the village since the beginning of 2015 and has achieved significant improvements in areas that were constantly targeted by those responsible.

Working with a number of committed individuals from within Colnbrook and Poyle, along with the support of Slough Borough Council's Resilience and Enforcement Teams, a major clean up of the Horton Road ditch has almost been completed. The attached photographs show the extent of the problem in early 2015 with corresponding photographs taken this month which shows the much cleaner ditch since the major items were removed and the vegetation cut back to limit the opportunity for further fly-tipping.

A clean up of the ditch in Horton Road, bordering Willow Close, is also due to take place shortly and photographs of the state of the ditch in early 2015 and of the cleaned up ditch will be published in a similar manner to the foregoing.

Other areas of Colnbrook/Poyle have also been targeted by fly-tippers and litter louts and these too are being tackled by the same committed individuals whose aim is to improve the environment we all share. Meetings have taken place with representatives from all of the adjoining local authorities as well as with Highways England to tackle the scourge of rubbish being dumped by unscrupulous individuals on our doorstep. These meetings will continue during 2016 as fly-tipping has taken place at all entry and exits routes to Colnbrook/Poyle and the removal of the rubbish requires a co-ordinated response.

Another 6 months has passed and like many people we ask the question "Where does time go?" We have spent the time building on existing relationships with SBC and the TVP and obviously continue to work with other village groups on matters of concern to our residents.

In terms of active members, we are a small group, although we have some 250 members plus over 1,000 friends on Facebook. We will shortly be launching a drive to recruit local people to volunteer to help the community in various ways. Some positions could involve a commitment of a few hours per month, whilst others are ad hoc as required from time to time.

Our website continues to grow in terms of visits averaging around 2,000 per month; whilst the Facebook pages reach some 3,500 / 4,000 per week with a hit rate of some 400 to 600 per week. We are now linked with groups in Wraysbury, Datchet, Iver, Richings Park and Iver Heath which enables us to share matters which are of common interest, with our neighbours.

The Facebook pages are fast becoming a reporting mechanism for road traffic incidents, burst water mains, lost and found pets and general local issues. We operate a Q&A facility when residents have queries about local issues. Local events figure quite highly, as do youth employment opportunities.

We continue to oppose a number of infrastructure projects that would threaten the quality of life in and around the village, although we can't deal with all proposals due to our limited resources. Heathrow expansion is still very active and you will find regular updates on our website.

Other regular matters that we continue to deal with include fly tipping; general litter; blocked drains; overgrown hedges; dangerous walls and fences, unsafe footpaths, and many other matters bought to our attention by members and friends.

We are currently working with members of St Thomas' Church, Youth Club, Scout's, and others to explore the idea of a Youth Centre specifically designed with the youth of our communities in mind.

The CCA is a member of the Colnbrook NAG, and we have a representative on the Colnbrook Village Hall Trust. We also run the Colnbrook Youth Club supported by YES and SBC.

Our open mornings have continued and are always popular with parents and carers, as they have the opportunity to see what goes on in the classroom and how we teach maths and English. It helps us all to work



together to ensure the children make the most of their learning opportunities. We will continue with these throughout the year.

Trips this term have included a visit to a local Gudwara where the children were made very welcome and it helped them to understand the importance of everyone in the local community and to appreciate other people's beliefs. The children from the Learning Resource Unit had the opportunity to practice real life skills with a trip to the Heathrow Bowling Centre. They had to make their own way there on the bus with staff and then buy their own snacks while they were there. It was a very successful trip.
