Parish Council Update

Over the last 6 months the Parish Council have been working on the following projects;

Village Clean Up



Working in conjunction with SBC, Community Groups and residents over the weekend of 9th and 10th September, a total 50 bags of non-recyclable litter and 39 bags of recyclable litter were collected.



Best Wishes

Resignations were received from both Peter Hood and Ray Angell, two of the original members of the Parish Council set up in 1995. After playing instrumental roles in a number of projects and community events, they decided to bring their 23 years service to an end. Their parting will be a huge loss to the Parish but we wish them all the best for the future.



During 23 years' service, Peter Hood held the title of Chair for 12 of those years, which is no mean feat. In the 2003/04 electoral year Peter was made Honorary Freeman of the Parish along with Geoff Preece.



Ray spent 16 years as Vice Chair, 9 years with Laurie Tucker and 7 years with Peter. In the 2013/14 electoral year Ray was made Honorary Freeman of the Parish along with the late "K" Laxman.

We wish them well for the future.

We would like to thank the Colnbrook Scout Group for their support and the number of Scouts, Cubs and Beavers that turned out over the weekend. With that in mind the Parish Council agreed to make a donation of £500 to the group.

Medical Centre

Sadly this has gone quiet. The Parish Council has been working with a potential GP, but to date there has been no further advancement with the GP gaining any additional partners. This will not stop the Parish Council in continuing to finding a GP to come to our village and bring in a very much needed Doctors Surgery.

Fly Tipping

A thorn in everyone's side and an ongoing project. Working with the Colnbrook Community Association (CCA) we have been tackling and reporting fly tipping to Slough Borough Council.

There are a number of Hot Spots, such as the car park off Cherwell Close and Tweed Road, the shops along Coleridge Crescent to name just two. We will continue to fight this issue with your support.



If you do see any areas where fly tipping has taken place, please report it to the Parish Council and CCA; together we will aim to keep our village clean.

Yes it's true, the Parish Council are working with our Ward Councillors to bring in more CCTV camera's to the community. The process is taking some time to finalise but once this has been completed these cameras will belong to the Parish and will be placed in Hot Spot areas upon consultation from the residents. We do hope to get these in place early 2018.

PCSO

The Parish Council are in talks with Thames Valley Police about the possibility of an additional PCSO, to be funded by the Parish Council. We can confirm we are at the early stages of negotiations and again we will keep you all updated of the progress.

War Memorial

Following the destruction of the memorial plaque on the Village Clock a number of residents asked the Parish Council for a more substantial monument to show our respect to those that lost their lives fighting. The Parish Council carried out a survey to find out how the residents felt; unfortunately we did not receive enough responses to take this further. This project has been noted to be reviewed again in the New Year.

Your Councillor's Update

Public Footpaths

The length of the footpath along the Colne Valley Way was approximately 3.6 miles, starting from the car park at the Village Hall, As my colleague Mike Nye and my self walk along Mill Street up the McArdle Way, and across the car park of Riverside Cafe, taking care to keep to the right hand side and

exiting onto the A4. After crossing the A4, at the traffic island, east of the bridge over the Colne Brook, and entering the field at the gate on the western side of the bridge.

The Colne Valley Way then continues to follow the Colne Brook up to the metalled road, Old Slade Lane and the entrance to the Thames Water Treatment Site. At this point there was clear evidence of fly tipping. This foot path links Colnbrook with Richings Park and Iver. From this bridle way a conventional bridle way runs along a line parallel to the M4 motorway, skirts around the boundary of Old Wood and across the centre of the field back to the gated entrance of the bridleway. A small insignificant foot path the leaves the bridleway at a point about 400 metres south of Old Wood path and travels South/West for 260 metres to meet with the A4 opposite McArdle Way.

The Colne Valley Way is a connected system of foot paths/bridle ways that stretch North to South of the Colne Valley Park, connecting Chorley Wood/ Rickmansworth in the North to Staines Moor and the river Thames in the south. It enters our parish at the crossing point over the M4(Old Slade Lane), tracks the Colne Brook, follows a route from the by pass alongside Riverside Cafe car park across McArdle Way and down Mill Street. At Colnbrook High Street, it turns right and follows the road down to the Splash where it turns left into Drift Way leaving our parish at the commencement of Horton No4 footpath, which runs between the Horton Brook Quarry on the right and Berkyn Manor Farm to the left.

Two other foot paths, on the Biffa landfill site, one leaving the A4 and heading North to stop at the M4 motorway, and the other linking the M4 opposite the flats development (Colne-henge) at the entrance to Colnbrook, to come out on Sutton Lane close to the entrance to the Biffa site.

The footpaths serving the parish are mainly contained within the triangle formed by the M25, M4 and the A4 Colnbrook By-pass. Only one connected route links the A4, where the majority of public transport services are to be found, to the south of Colnbrook where most of the community reside. With the proposed expansion of Heathrow Airport the foot paths to the north of the A4 could be lost.

Neighbourhood Plan

I have been involved in a lot of projects, committee and sub-committee, but my next project is setting up a Neighbourhood Plan, which a letter has being sent to Slough Borough Council under the Localism Act 2011.

Neighbourhood Plan (sometimes called a Neighbourhood Development Plan) is a way of helping local communities to influence the planning of the area in which they live and work. It can be used to:

- Develop a shared vision for your neighbourhood.
- Choose where new homes, shops, offices and other development should be built
- Identify and protect important local green spaces.
- Influence what new buildings should look like.

In areas that are dominated by business interests, so for example a trading estate, a Business Neighbourhood Plan could be developed. It will follow the same process as a normal Neighbourhood Plan but in that area two referenda will be held as businesses, as well as any residents, will have a right to vote.

One good initiative to come out of Slough Borough Council is that all ward councillors, like me, have been allocated a budget of £25,000pa to spend on capital projects in their wards. Believe me it is not as easy to do as to say! I have chosen to spend the

bulk of my allocation on additional CCTV coverage in Colnbrook, which I hope we will get before the Spring.

Presently, Colnbrook has one permanent CCTV camera installation outside Ye Olde George pub, and we can bid for the temporary use of some mobile/re-deployable CCTV cameras that are shared around the whole of Slough. The main thrust of what I have asked for is two state-of-the-art digital long-look permanent CCTV camera installations at either end of the traffic calmed area in the middle of Colnbrook.

Together with the permanent camera we already have we should get coverage of the entire length of the traffic calmed area, plus a big improvement in community safety and enforcement. The new cameras should also be able to look down part of Horton Road and London Road towards Colne-henge, so the almost daily traffic congestion there can be monitored; and they will be able to look down the northern end of Poyle Road, and along the Old Bath Road past the Holiday Inn, so we can monitor how much HGV traffic there is, for example.

M25 Junction I 5

I am pleased to report that the yellow hatched give-way box that I and others have been asking for to prevent gridlock for traffic leaving Poyle through the Junction I 5 roundabout has now be painted onto the road. Combined with some re-phasing of the Junction I 5 traffic lights, there has been a noticeable reduction in backed-up traffic that used to extend all the way onto Poyle Road.

Doctors' Surgery

Though there is little to report, I am asking a doctor in another part of Slough who recently announced he was having to close his surgery, because he could find a suitable site for it in its present locality, to explore the possibility of moving it to Colnbrook.

The past six months in Colnbrook have been eventful with the Slough Plan reaching its final stages; various building development problems; road and air traffic issues; major changes within the Parish Council; turmoil within the Slough Labour Party; an absent MP; and so much more.

The CCA continues to inform residents via it's website, Facebook and Twitter pages on all matters as they arise and know that residents find our posts useful as follower and friend numbers continue to increase dramatically each month.

Looking forward, we will continue to work with the Parish Council, Slough BC and other agencies to improve our communities, and with other groups to publicise their events and achievements.

The resignations of two leading councillors, and the passing away of a third and much valued member, has given the communities the opportunity for a fresh start, and for the Parish Council and its largely new, unencumbered membership (except for the political appointees!) the opportunity to go back to basics as to what a Parish Council is there for. Essential focus should remain on key issues such as fly-tipping, traffic issues, clean parks, cleared hedgerows, anti-social behaviour matters; crime issues; and cleared drains and ditches. These are simple basic issues that affect residents directly and indeed issues that the CCA deal with daily. If we could increase the level of cooperation with Councillors, a joint approach is a much better way forward for all concerned.

Having said that, we must concede that Slough BC is probably the best of the local area authorities in dealing with these issues, as our relationships with neighbouring communities in South Bucks and RBWM quite clearly demonstrate.

Colnbrook with Doyle Darish Council



The Colnbrook Community Partnership (CCP) is a charitable working group formed in 2006 with the remit to bring funding into the community for the improvement of or provision of facilities that benefit our residents (See our listing on the Charities Commission website against our registration 1115166), the project funding coming from the Landfill Communities Fund (LCF). We have been active in areas associated with our local green spaces, areas that are important to our community fulfilling several important criteria, safe places for our children to play, sports facilities and green corridors to attract without containing wildlife. Pippins Park to the east of the parish at Poyle and the Recreation Ground in the centre of the parish, both sites have benefitted from investment brought in by the partnership, and we will continue to seek upgrades to play equipment and environmental improvements.

This last year we concentrated upon nature sites in our area, Albany Park where planting of further Cox's apple trees, new fencing around the flood relief channel and improvements to the entrance path from Old Bath Road have been delivered. New custom benches and the creation of wild flower beds at the northern end adjacent to the County Ditch have been provided. In order to improve site security, a new gate and two telescopic rhino bollards will be installed to replace the damaged gate along the western boundary, following the latest incursion onto the site. This site is owned by SBC and provides the function of flood relief, space for recreational use and dog walking coupled with a varied natural habitat to attract wildlife.

Crown Meadow, opposite our Recreation Ground, is the site we wish to bring some regenerative activity to bring it back toward the status of a Local Wildlife Site (LWS). There is a proposed management plan for the site, prepared by Groundwork Thames Valley, to cover the period from 2012 until 2022, although the plan has not become adopted, it provides a good basis to move improvements forward towards the goal of a LWS (Classification lost about 2009). We have achieved a funding source to carry out improvements to the south western corner, in order to open a nature trail through a dense wooded area and open the pond to natural light, which will bring benefit



to biodiversity. We will be working with Slough Borough Council, site owners, to achieve a level of site management that will enhance for both wildlife and visitors. Footpath clearance including scrub maintenance, meadow cutting. A successful mowing regime to avoid creating uniform areas of grassland and removal of cuttings which reduces the build up of a litter layer is essential. Leaving areas of long grass and rotating areas of grassland to be cut each year allows for a population of invertebrates to remain, recover and hopefully thrive; different height areas of grassland to benefit different invertebrate species; provide varied pockets of food sources and retain plants not ready to seed at the time of mowing. Taller vegetation and tussocks allow larger insects to complete their lifecycles and overwinter.

This type of mowing regime benefits a wide variety of species. Sustaining a meadow's invertebrate population supports insect eaters such as bats, reptiles, amphibians and insect eating birds, alongside a range of birds, such as yellowhammers, goldfinches and greenfinches, which feed on grass and flower seeds throughout the year. Leaving uncut margins and corners in mown fields to extend the availability of seeds will create habitat for small mammals, providing prey for owls and kestrels.

Crown Meadow could become a rich source for educating our children about the importance of caring for nature, but we also need to encourage volunteers from our community to become engaged with supervised tasks of managing the site. Ultimately to form a Friends of Crown Meadow group which could become self-sufficient in time, to carry out the necessary tasks.

Colnbrook Flood Action Group

The C-FA group called an emergency meeting in October this year with the Environment Agency, SBC, RBW&M, Thames Water supported by the National Flood Forum.

This was called after the Clean Up Colnbrook weekend took place in early September this year, where we found major ditches and areas of the village blocked, full of debris, shrubbery and more concerning fly tipped items such as fridges, beds, bikes...

The waterways and ditches are a priority to be maintained and kept clean, we do not want a repeat of February 2014.

The team met and discussed ways forward and a cleanup of areas highlighted took place over the following weeks, and will continue.

The NAG will pick up some of the actions and continue to work with the multi agency team as discussed above.

We are looking for volunteers to do walkabouts and observations on a weekly basis, if you would like to get involved contact us through our Facebook page.

From Colnbrook to Aru or how God called us to put words into action!

A Found Farewell by Peter Wyard

At the end of January, I will step down as Vicar of Colnbrook and Datchet after 12 years. That's quite a big chunk of my life. There have been some wonderful highlights, some struggles, and the reward of ministering in these two parishes and being there for everyone. That is what St. Thomas' will continue to do. Our vision, as you can read when you enter by the church porch, is to be a place of worship and celebration before God, and to serve the community.

So it will be a real wrench to leave, as I am realising more clearly as the time for departure approaches. But I'm definitely not retiring! In fact my wife Patricia and I are setting out on a big adventure to the Democratic Republic of Congo (DRC). We have committed ourselves to three years: Patricia will work as a doctor, supporting and teaching local nurses and doctors, and continuing her speciality of palliative medicine, where Aru is something of a pioneering place in the DRC. I will work as a theological educator and supporter of the local clergy. I hope to visit ministers in their rural parishes (some deep in the bush), which should be interesting and exciting.

In the last year or so we made two short visits to Uganda and the DRC, to explore possible opportunities for a few years hence, as we thought at the time. But after we returned from our second visit in March this year, things seem to fast forward, and we felt that we were being called to this service now, while we still have a reasonable amount of energy, and our family circumstances are as good as they could be.

Of all the places we visited, it was Aru that really struck a chord. Aru is in the far north-east of Congo, close to the border with South Sudan and Uganda. It is fairly remote and very rural. Although Aru is the capital of the (Anglican) diocese, it feels more like an overgrown village. It's a peaceful place where we received a very warm welcome and immediately began to form friendships.

We had a strong sense of three things calling us to Aru: the size of the need (DRC is the third poorest country in the world), the combination of skills and gifts that God has given us as a couple, and the strength of the invitation from the Diocese. Bishop Ande had emphasised to both of us his vision for raising standards in everything the church does: both in its medical and theological work.

After much prayer our call was put to the test during a two day selection conference with Church Mission Society in their Oxford offices, at the end of which we were selected to train as "mission partners". It's a big challenge, and feels quite daunting at times. "Chucking everything in" and starting a completely new life isn't easy. We think we can cope with the physical hardships: no running water, no proper electricity, no domestic appliances, very poor mobile signal and internet, dirt roads, the heat. We will be living in a simple bungalow, but still much better than the dwellings of most of the local people. Doing everything in French, especially teaching theology, will be a particular challenge for me. For both of us, making the adjustment to a working environment which is very poor in material resources (e.g. theological books and medical equipment) while trying to raise standards, will also be a big challenge.

But it's also a great adventure and a wonderful opportunity. We are very grateful to God, to our children who have been extraordinarily supportive, and to the many friends and parishioners who have encouraged us with their interest and support.

The people we met were extraordinarily grateful for the interest we took in them as brothers and sisters in Christ and we hope we can be fruitful in that way. Sharing in Christian fellowship and solidarity with the local people is at least as important as any professional help we can offer.

Are we living on cloud nine all of the time now? There are a lot of practicalities to be sorted out, Tropical Medicine to be studied by Patricia (exam in April!), French to be improved for both of us, finding out how to teach theology in a relevant and contextual way to young African Christian leaders-to-be, and lots of goodbyes to be said our friends in and outside the church. We also want to ensure that our son Henry is well supported as he will still be in the middle of his university studies when we leave. We know we can trust our daughters Maria and Catherine to keep an eye out for him, not on him! We are very grateful to the friends who have expressed a particular concern for our young adult children; and have offered very practical help: thank you!

We also have to raise the money for our budget as set by CMS. We are fortunate enough to be able to self-sponsor ourselves for about half of the cost, and will be approaching churches and individuals to make up the difference. It is one of these practicalities we are not used to, but it is good to think in terms of seeking support for the work we will be doing, rather than for ourselves.

Thames Valley Police has had some internal structural changes occur in how we form our teams to deal with the work we have. As a member of the public requiring

assistance you should not see a change. You will still have the police deal according to the type of crime and vulnerability identified.

The Emergency Response Team and the Investigation Hub both work a pattern covering the 24h day. The way the neighbourhood policing team is structured has also seen some changes. The team covering Colnbrook and Poyle is now slightly broader and are responsible for Colnbrook Poyle and Foxborough.

That means the officers originally from each area now have a shared responsibility for the whole area. This geographic team are who you will see and are the outward facing face of the police in your community, responsible for the ongoing community engagement. This team is slightly smaller.

However, we have a Problem Solving Team (PST) who will work to target specific issues to reduce demand on the Police across the East Sector, thereby freeing up more time to deal with other issues.

The team is now made up of myself;

- Inspector 4940 Neil Misselbrook (East Sector Inspector)
- Sergeant 442 Tom O'Brien (East Sector Geographic Sergeant)

Specific to Colnbrook, Poyle and Foxborough

- PC 5468 Rob Ashcroft
- PCSO 9521 Terrie Parker-James
- PCSO 6944 Reece Sylvester,
- PCSO 7130 Mansel Jackson
- PCSO 9553 Kurt Henney

The East Sector PST of four PC's is led by PS 6358 Johnny White, the work of this team will be directed to specific issues as and when they arise.

Members of the community are involved in shaping the priorities to which the police are working to on a neighbourhood level.

The next Colnbrook, Poyle and Foxborough community forum is being held in November to shape this. This will

result in the priorities being set and reported on quarterly.

The Colnbrook and Poyle Neighbourhood Action Group (NAG) remains in place and assists in the local responsibilities in working in partnership to resolve issues.

This work is key, as is the work completed with the Parish Council in order to increase the community resilience and the ability to contribute to preventing and detecting crime.

As an overview of the crime figures for the year to date (01/04/2017 - 14/04/2017) compared to the same period in 2016 all crime is down by 3% (841 offences recorded, 26 fewer than last year). Crimes against society are down by 4%, but more significantly burglary dwelling offences are down 23% (40 offences this YTD) and violence with injury is down 40% (48 offences this YTD).

Information on the work and also crime prevention advice and more can be found on the Thames Valley Police website, **https://www.thamesvalley.police.uk/**, this also has links through to the crime maps/figures for your area.

We would also urge all members of the community to sign up to Thames Valley Alert **https://www.thamesvalleyalert. co.uk/** to receive messages of information, crime alerts or witness appeals local to the area in which you live or work by email, text or telephone.

With Christmas fast approaching and the associated valuable items you may have in your possession I would direct people to Immobilise **https://www.immobilise. com/** a national property register approved by secure by design. By registering your details you can then record all your property with serial numbers and pictures (i.e. bikes, phones, computers, cameras, jewellery etc.) and increase your chances of getting them back if they are stolen.


